Motion passed to amend policy Town and Chinese city sign on much needed autism therapy historic twinning agreement

Halton Hills Town Council passed a motion to request to amend the Province of Ontario's policy on Autism Intensive Behavioural Intervention (IBI) therapy at the council meeting held on Monday, June 20.

The motion comes as a result of the Provincial Government's new Autism Program, for which IBI therapy is no longer available for children five years and older. Under the new program IBI will only be available for children two to four years of age, while children five and up will be transitioned to the Applied Behavioural Analysis (ABA) services. Families with children on the IBI wait list who are five years and older will be issued \$8,000 in a one-time only funding to purchase services while transitioning off the wait

According to the Geneva Centre for Autism, ABA is a scientific process that identifies the functional relationship between observable behaviour and environmental context, using that information to enhance social and personal well-being. IBI applies the principals ABA in an intensive setting to result in behaviour change and improvement.

David and Linda Galvao, who have two sons who both have autism. spoke before council in support of the motion. David Galvao described the therapy as life changing, explaining that their older son began IBI therapy when he was six-years-old. Prior to beginning the therapy, their son had been nonverbal, but after only 30 days of IBI therapy they heard their son speak for the first time, saying, 'I love you.' Now the Galvaos fear their younger son who is six years old will not be afforded the same opportunity as his older brother, despite having already been on a the waiting list for IBI for three years.

Melanie Fox, a single mother with a twelve year old son who has autism also spoke in support of the motion. As her son was diagnosed late, he too will not receive the desperately needed IBI therapy.

The motion, move by Mayor Rick Bonnette, makes four requests of the province:

- Ensure families leaving the current IBI waitlist that the level of intervention their child needs will be provided through the transition and under the new delivery model;
- Ensure that all children are assessed equally for the level of intensive therapy they need regardless of age;
- Ensure oversight by professionals and parents based on 'development progress criteria and milestones;
- Consider a transitory Direct Funding Offering to accompany the current Direct Service Offering Model.

"This is not something that is just here in Halton Hills," said Bonnette. "This is something that parents of autistic children have been dealing with throughout Ontario. I don't think anybody wants to see their child fall behind."

Bonnette went on to explain that by approving the motion, they would be joining other municipalities across the province to get parents the help they need.
