The youngster was hanging around the practice area on day one when Australian Nick Kyrgios was hitting balls with someone when Kyrgios noticed Surette on the sideline watching. Hayden offered to serve as the ball boy before the temperamental 21-year-old changed his mind.

Ball boy is the worst job on the planet, go get one of my racquets and play tennis!, Kyrgios told Surette.

We hit balls for about five minutes and then we sat down and talked for a while and had a drink of water...He said one of the favourite things he liked about being in Toronto was playing Pokemon Go, remembered Surette.

Last year, when the women played in Toronto at the Rogers Cup, Surette got an autographed towel from Montreal's Eugenie Bouchard and discovered that tennis players appear to be more approachable than most pro athletes.

The highlight of Surette's week came on Friday night after witnessing his *most* favourite player, the fourth-seeded Raonic, lose in the quarterfinals in somewhat of a surprise to #10 Monfils.
