Well, my pick for the RBC Canadian Open didn t work out so well with David Hearn and a handful of other Canucks missing the cut at a crispy Glen Abbey last week.

That was okay though, as we were treated to some exceptional golf by 21-year-old Jared du Toit from Kimberley, B.C.

Playing in his first professional event, the Team Canada Men s Amateur member shot an incredible -9 for the tournament and finished in a tie for ninth, three shots back of the eventual winner Jhonattan Vegas.

Incredible composure for a young man who was only one stroke off the lead going into Sunday s final round.

With the course playing unusually firm and fast in our drought conditions in southern Ontario, the players were forced to play a lot of pitch shots out of trouble and from just off greens and fairways.

I often see beginner golfers and some experienced players attempting to make pitch shots tougher than they need to be. They will

often open the clubface and or their stance to much for the type of shot they are playing.

The open clubface and open stance both and an extra element of danger to some very straightforward pitches.
