D Avilar leads British charge to Euro title

Softball isn t in the Olympics this year, but Chelsea D Avilar and her teammates can t wait until 2020 when the sport is expected to make its return to the Summer Games.

The Christ the King Secondary School graduate played a major role in helping her adopted country win the Under-19 Women's European Championships earlier this month in Barcelona, Spain, including a sparkling defensive play in the Grand Final against Italy in a 1-0 triumph.

It was the first time a fast-pitch team from Great Britain won a European championship at any age level.

Nineteen-year-old D Avilar, a shortstop going into her second year on scholarship at Coastal Carolina University, also was adept at the plate during the tournament, in which fourth-ranked Great Britain went 10-0.

In the semifinal, she delivered the game-winning RBI with a walk-off single in the bottom of the seventh inning in a heart-pounding 7-6 victory

against defending-champion Czech Republic, which had led 6-0 after two

D Avilar went 3 for 3 with a pair of doubles in an earlier rout of host

In the Grand Final, a pitchers duel in which only one of the four hits in the contest left the infield, Italy had runners on second and third base with two out in the sixth inning when the batter drove a grounder between third and short. D Avilar made a backhanded grab and threw the runner out at first to keep the game scoreless, then reached base in the bottom of the seventh on a crucial Italian fielding error that led to the winning run.

It s expected that Chelsea will join Great Britain's senior team next season with an opportunity to play alongside older sister Hayley, who took the summer off from competitive fastpitch to concentrate on an internship.

She attends Northwood University in Michigan and is an outfielder on the varsity softball squad heading into her senior year.

Both are eligible to play for Great Britain as their biological father is from England.
