Plenty of drama at Olympic tourney

The medalists, the course and the finish in the first Olympic tournament in 112 years did not disappoint. The players had nothing but praise for the course and the set up for the four days of stroke play competition.

The course had a pair of par 5s to open and close the 18-hole links course designed by Gil Hanse. Both holes provided plenty of drama, which is what they were designed to do.

The two holes forced players to decide how to play the hole depending on the prevailing winds on the golf course. Lay up and make birdie the hard way or go for it in two and test your short game to make birdie or better.

This is a conundrum faced by the average golfer who hits a good drive on a par 5 and then has to decide what to do with the second shot.

I always tell my students to play to their strengths. If you are comfortable with your fair-

way woods or hybrids and have a great short game then go for it.

If you are better with your wedges or short irons from the fairway and are a great putter, then the lay up may be the better play based on averages.

I also mention that if you drive it into trouble, don t compound the problem by trying to get it up there as far as you can. Sometimes it is best to take your medicine and play the averages.
