Halton Hills provides support for local business

The Town of Halton Hills continues to provide financial support to the local small business community through the Community Improvement Plan (CIP). The program initiated in 2014, has 28 individual programs that can be accessed as required to stimulate business growth.

Currently the programs are geared towards Downtown Acton, Downtown Georgetown and the Guelph Street Corridor located in Georgetown. Funding is provided for façade improvements based on 50 per cent of eligible costs to a maximum of \$12,500 and no interest loans to a maximum of \$20,000 for building improvements.

Acton Optical applied for the loan under the CIP to re-roof the store that is housed in the historic former church located at 80 Mill Street E. in Acton.

Children left in hot car

A 38 year old Milton mother of three is under investigation following an incident at the Milton Super Store parking lot early Wednesday evening.

Officers were called to the parking lot around 6:45 p.m. in response to a citizen's complaint that three children were in a car in an "expectant Mother" parking space. The car was parked in full sunlight and had its engine turned off. Four windows were open only approximately 3 inches each. The car was locked and the

alarm had been activated.

Officers attended and persuaded the oldest child to open the door so that officers could check on them and get some fresh air flowing through the car. The children, aged between 4 and 12 years old, appeared hot, and the youngest appeared to be sleeping yet perspiring profusely. As a precaution, the officers summoned an ambulance to the scene. The children were checked by paramedics and appeared to be suffering no ill effects from the heat.

About 11 minutes after

the initial call, the mother returned to the vehicle. She had a conversation with the officers and provided her excuse as to why she left her three children in a locked car, with no air conditioning, in 32 degree Celsius ambient heat.

Police will be reviewing video surveillance footage of the parking area to determine how many minutes, in excess of the known 11 minutes, that the children were subjected to these conditions. Officers will then determine what charges could and may be laid.

Man facing numerous fraud charges

A Toronto man is scheduled to appear in Milton Court following a lengthy fraud investigation.

A 36 year old Toronto man is facing a number of charges after racking up \$28,000 on bogus credit cards.

In June, members of the One District Criminal Investigations Bureau began looking into a series of fraudulent transactions which had been made at retail locations in Halton

It is alleged that between the 19 of May and the 22 of June Khosa attended retail locations not only in Halton but throughout the GTA and purchased merchandise using fraudulent credit card data.

Police located the accused at a high end condominium building in Toronto. He was arrested without incident and held for bail.He will appear in Milton court to answer to the following charges:

- 9 counts of fraudulent use of credit card data
- · 11 counts of obtain credit by false pretences
- · 20 counts of breach of
