GLIC presents Studio Shows

Every year, the Georgetown Little Theatre offers its members the opportunity to stage plays that wouldn t normally be selected for the mainstage productions.

These are the Studio Shows, and this year's crop of edgy one-acts takes place Sept. 15-17 (33 Stewarttown Rd., Georgetown) and Sept. 22-24 at Acton Town Hall Centre (19 Willow St. N.).

In the past, the Studio Shows have included classic one-act plays and workshop productions of new works. Edgier, darker and sometimes completely experimental, the Studio Shows were added to GLT's season to give members a chance to try their hand at something different.

Comedy, drama, terror you never know what the night may hold.

The plays are different, and so are the backstage roles. Members are encouraged to take on new challenges, and this year includes two actors turned directors.

GLT regular Mike Tadic has been keeping Georgetown audiences in stitches with his comic roles for longer than he cares to mention. This year he is directing his first play, one he's wanted to do for 25 years. Dispatches From Hell examines complacency in the face of evil.

An award-winning one-act, the story revolves around a willfully ignorant Nazi functionary who schedules the trains bound for concentration camps in World War Two.

Rosanna Armata recently joined the GLT, acting in recent mainstage productions. She was asked if she wanted to try her hand at directing, and took on a Grand-Guignol farce about matrimony and infidelity called I Want to Go Home.

Written in the early 20th century to shock prudish Victorian audiences, this outrageous sex comedy caps each night.

In between the drama and the comedy is Aria Da Capo, a Pulitzer Prize-winning play about two shepherds who chance upon a harlequinade when things go

Directed by Taylor Grist, this dark pantomime looks like a light British comedy, but poses much darker questions than you expect.
