Halton receives funding to enhance water and wastewater infrastructure

Yesterday, the federal and provincial governments announced that Halton Region will receive close to \$40 million in allocated funding, as part of the federal government's Clean Water and Wastewater Fund (CWWF), to enhance Halton's water and wastewater infrastructure. This funding is part of Phase 1 of the federal government's Infrastructure Plan, announced in the 2016 federal budget.

"We are pleased that federal and provincial governments have allocated close to \$40 million in funding for Halton to enhance and maintain our water and wastewater systems," said Halton Regional Chair Gary Carr. "Growth is a key issue in Halton, and this funding will be a critical support in maintaining the underground system of pipes that brings clean drink-

ing water to our residents. Our high quality drinking water helps preserve the quality of life that makes Halton a great place to live."

The CWWF is a bilateral agreement between the federal and provincial governments to make more than \$1.1 billion in combined funding available to municipal governments to support their water projects. This fund is part of the federal government's \$120-billion investing in Canada plan to support public infrastructure across the country over the next 10 years.

To be eligible for the funding, Halton Region needs to submit shovel and investment-ready projects for consideration by October 31. One of Halton's projects to be considered for funding is a feedermain project that

was scheduled to begin in 2017. This project is a critical component of the water distribution network providing clean drinking water to residents.

Halton Region advocates for long-term infrastructure funding to the federal and provincial governments; the CWWF provides up to 50 per cent federal funding, and 25 per cent provincial funding, with the remaining 25 per cent to be paid by the municipality.

"This significant infrastructure investment is important to Halton Region residents and contributes to providing and delivering a high quality infrastructure to our community that enhances the quality of life to our residents," said Chair Carr.

Charging stations now available at local library branches


Thanks to a sponsorship from Halton Hills Community Energy Corporation, the Halton Hills Public Library now has a complementary charging station available in both its branches.
