
#### THE RACE IS ON

Want-to-be Rockwood politicians - now is your chance. Veteran Ward Three Councillor Doug Breen wants to "move up a rung" and will run for the Ward Eight seat on Wellington County Council in October's municipal election. He will not seek re-election to Guelph/Eramosa Township Council, a seat he's held almost continuously since 1997.

Breen made the announcement at last Monday's GET council meeting, saying he was giving plenty of time to people who were "waiting politely for me to get out of my road." Breen said he'll miss the local favour of Township council where the "rubber meets the road."

Rockwood Foodland's Steve Liebig, a parttime Guelph/Eramosa Township firefighter, is campaigning for the seat Breen will vacate in the October municipal elec-

Incumbent Ward One Councillor David Wolk filed his nomination papers following last week's meet, joining incumbent Mayor Chris White, and Ward Two Councillor Corey Woods in seeking re-election.



#### LATE START FOR NEW SCHOOL?

The Upper Grand District School Board (UGDSB) warns Rockwood's new elementary school might not be ready for September due to severe weather and a late construction start,

Carrie Conrad, currently at Brisbane PS, will begin as Principal of the as-yet unnamed school in the south end of Rockwood. If necessary, students at the new school would be housed temporarily at Rockwood Centennial PS.

#### GARDEN SUITE MEETING

As required by the province, Guelph/Eramosa Township will hold a public meeting – a frustrating "total waste of time" according to one politician into a requested extension of a garden/granny suite at a Side Road 14 agricultural property.

Township planner Bernie Hermsen said the initial 10-year approval was followed by a three-year extension, and now, another three year extension request. He said the Garden Suites were meant as a temporary retirement-type housing, which eventually would be removed.

Councillor Corey Woods questioned the need for a public meeting every three years, a process that costs the applicants, who he described a young retirees, thousands of dollars over their "hands are tied" by the Planning Act, but they will make the renewal process as straightforward as they can, with minimal costs to the applicant. The renewal application public meeting is February 18.

#### NEW VILLAGE LOTS

Owners of a 2.5-acre property on Cobblestone Place received a severance to create a new residential lot, splitting a half-acre parcel from their 2.5-acre, irregularly shaped lot.

Township planners supported the severance, subject to a number of conditions.

Guelph/Eramosa Township Council approved an additional residential lot on Station Street, allowing an existing vacant lot to be divided into two. Council approved a minor variance as both lots are slightly less wide than required by the Township bylaw.

The OPP has thrown its support behind the Find Me ID program, an App developed by the Canadian Centre for Child Protection, which allow parents to store current photographs and information about their child.
