Courting and counting votes

Halton Hills municipal elections might be improved if it were easier and more convenient to cast ballots, according to Georgetown Councillor Moya Johnson who asked for expanded voting opportunities on Monday during general committee debate of a staff report on advance poll dates, special poll locations and hours of operation.

In an effort to show voters "we care by making it convenient for you," Johnson asked staff to investigate all-day, work-day voting at the Civic Centre for up to a month prior to the October 27 election, and to reconsider expanding polling locations to include the Acton and Georgetown libraries, which staff said had been excluded because of parking issues.

Town Clerk Susanne Jones said issues including accessibility and staffing are considered when selecting polling locations, and suggested they maintain the "status quo" for this election and make changes for the 2018 vote.

Undeterred, Johnson asked staff to return with a report on the estimated cost to open up the voting for a three or four week period. "Our last election...it was much more open and we had electronic voting and the turnout was still, what

The poor voter turnout in - 30 per cent or less?" Johnson said adding they need to know how much it would cost to go one or two steps forward.

Clerk Jones said she would report back at the April 28 council meeting with the pros, cons and

Eligible voters will be able to cast early ballots at new "Vote Anywhere" advance poll locations, no matter where they reside in the Town of Halton Hills. The advance poll locations include the Acton arena, Dufferin Rural Heritage Community Centre in Prospect Park, and Georgetown Marketplace Mall and the Civic Centre.

General committee members also set the advance poll dates and locations, the hours for special polling locations, and again approved using optical scanning vote tabulators to count marked paper ballots, as was done in the 2010 municipal election.

To meet criteria for accessible voting, voting places will also be located at three Georgetown locations including the Bennett Health Care Centre, Mountainview Residence and Extendicare, Halton Hills.

The three advance poll dates are Wednesday, October 15, from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., Saturday, October 18, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Wednesday, October 22,
