One hundred years ago, Anna Jarvis of Grafton, West Virginia, was finally successful after trying for six years, in having Mother's Day recognized as a "holiday" in the United States.

She trademarked the phrases Mother's Day and second Sunday in May and created an International Mother's Day Association noting that Mother's Day should be singular, not plural, so that each family could honour its mother.

Jarvis was not impressed with the commercialization of Mother's Day which really took off during the 1920's. She wanted Mom to be truly appreciated in an uncluttered manner.

Commercialism seems to have overtaken the day. Over the weekend, the newspaper/ inserts/ flyers included page after page of things to get mom. I think I've always done pretty well in that category for my mom. I always try to think of something that is special for her.
