ELECTION SIGN UPDATE

Errant municipal election signs in Guelph/ Eramosa Township will be removed – but no one will face a \$5,000 fine for violating the election sign bylaw with recent changes approved by Township council.

In a report to council recently, Clerk Meaghen Reid noted the bylaw had not been updated in five years, and that the new restrictions included some "common sense changes" including ensuring elections signs are not the same size, shape or colour as traffic safety signs, and

the Township logo can not be used.

A previous \$5,000 set fine for violation of the sign bylaw has been removed, and Reid said new stronger language means offending/hazardous signs will now be removed.

Mayor Chris White, who will need election signs now that he faces a challenge from Rockwood Councillor John Scott for the top job, said the revised bylaw should ensure election signs are put in the "safe, and in the right place" with no confusion.

Public invited to meeting on Hidden Quarry application

The science-heavy report everyone has been waiting for - responses from all of the agencies and experts on the proposed Hidden Quarry application - will be debated at a public meeting slated for August 12 at Rockmosa.

"This is our first real opportunity to get a look at everything together, as opposed to piecemeal," said Guelph/Eramosa Township Mayor Chris White said on Sunday, calling their planner's report an "important step" in concluding the process of dealing with an application by James Dick Construction Ltd.

It wants to develop a sand and gravel quarry on Highway 7, between Acton and Rockwood. The proposal needs a rezoning from Guelph/Eramosa Township to allow extraction on land currently zoned agricultural/hazard, and a provincial licence to extract up to 700,000-tonnes of limestone, from below the water table, annually.

The application sparked formation of the Concerned Residents Coalition (CRC) which is pushing for a fair and transparent review of the application. Like the CRC, Mayor White said the issues are clear, including the quarry's potential impact on the environment from blasting, increased truck traffic, water quality and quantity and air quality.

"This report should give us a broad idea of the concerns that have been raised...that doesn't means they are going to be looked at too our satisfaction - we may say we still have problems..." White said, adding they may end up asking for more information.

White said the release of the report and the public meeting will allow individual councillors, and Council, to formulate their positions on the application. "Once the report is in, I'm hoping this will move us far enough along so we can begin to say these are the things that we still need to get, or these are the things we are still concerned about," he said, adding until now, they haven't had enough scientific information to make a decision.

White conceded that regardless of how Council votes on the application, the final decision will probably be made at the Ontario Municipal Board, referred there by whoever may be unhappy with Council's decision on the rezoning application.

No pre-registration for the meeting is required and everyone is invited. All of the Hidden Quarry reports to date are available at www.get.on.ca White said this report should be up on the site approximately a week before the public meeting in Rockwood.
