German student is Acton Au Pair

After successfully completing advanced examinations at the end of high school, 18-year Lea Bitzen was poised to take on the world from her home town of Frankfurt, Germany. Lea chose to come to Acton on a working holiday as an au pair (french for "on equal terms") and become a participant in what has been called "the world's oldest cultural exchange program".

Typically, an au pair is a young person from a foreign country who stays with a host family for a limited time period (under one year) and takes on light housework and childcare duties. The International Au Pair Association (IAPA) explains that the main purpose is to learn about another culture, and to take that experience back home. While the concept of au pairing is more familiar in Europe, the IAPA was founded at a 1994 world conference in Vancouver. Lea came to Acton through the American Institute for Foreign Study (AIFS) which has recently included Canada as a travel option.

For a European student, Canada is a more exotic locale than Australia, New Zealand and the USA. Lea explains that "I didn't want to go to those countries to be like everyone else, I wanted to discover something new and more extraordinary". Lea's potential Can-adian host family emailed and video conferenced with her to get acquainted before she set off on her adventure. She arrived in Canada just a few weeks ago, flying from Frankfurt to Vancouver with

seven other AIFS au pairs. After a twoday lay-over, the group split up to go to their various host families and Lea flew to Toronto.

Lea had "a perfect opportunity to see a little of the Canadian west coast", and enthuses that "Canada is perfect for me! Your country offers so much." She studied English and French intensively at school. "Besides the wonderful diversity of language, Canada offers an amazing culture, attitude and landscape. I have travelled a lot, to almost every country in Europe and to China, and Canada is topping everything as one of the most beautiful countries in the world."

She has quickly settled in with her host family, where she helps to look after two girls aged 7 and 9. She makes them breakfast each morning, helps them get dressed for school, prepares their lunch bags and homework and takes them to wait for the school bus. Then she has some spare time which she spends meeting other au pairs and exploring her new environment, as well as doing light housekeeping, shopping and preparing dinner. After school, "We get homework done and practice the piano. When the girls have no other activities like dance, soccer or piano, we have time to play together.'

Lea would like to encourage other Canadian families and young people to look into an au pair program. "It's a big adventure, advantage, experience and cultural exchange for everybody. For you, the au pair, and especially for the
