SUICIDE PREVENTION COALITION ANNUAL MEETING

On Friday November 7, Halton residents are invited to attend the Halton Suicide Prevention Coalitions's Annual Meeting and Community Workshop. The focus of this year's event is inclusivity and connecting those at risk of being marginalized with the supports they need.

The annual meeting will feature two speakers - Baldev Mutta who has worked for the last 23 years developing an integrated holistic model to address substance abuse, mental health and family violence within the South Asian community.

Following workshop, the Coalition is also offering a free safe Talk training session, which helps prevent participants identify people with thoughts of suicide, and teaches them how to engage individuals in need and connect them to further help.

Praise for retiring parade organizers

If you're watching November's Acton Santa Claus Parade, give a cheer to retired firefighter and Parade Chair Bill Spielvogel as his car goes past. Bill's wife Diane also deserves a special thank-you. She'll be at a corner with her grandkids and great-grandkids, refilling the candy baskets. For 30 years, Bill and Diane have been volunteering yearround, up-front and behind the scenes, to put the Santa Claus Parade together. This is their final parade as organizers; Bill's retiring as Chair. Bill was part of the committee formed in 1985 when the Acton Firefighters Association took parade management over from the YMCA. He was nominated Parade Chair in 1986 and held the position ever since. It's been "a labour of love", as Diane says.

It's part of their history. A parade wouldn't work without a band, and the Acton Citizens Band has led the Acton Parade since the beginning. Diane's father (also a firefighter) was in the Acton Citizen's Band. So was Bill's father, and Bill. The families know the pride in cheering as the parade passes, watching out for that special person. It's the same today with Bill and Diane's three daughters. six grandchildren and (almost) 12 great-grandchildren. (The twelfth is due in February 2015). "They're all so proud of their Poppa. They usually all come to watch, except for those that are out west."

There are six bands this year. "The Acton Citizen's Band leads the parade; another band brings in Santa Claus. That leaves four bands to be divided amongst other participants." Diane has special memories of the year the popular Burlington Teen Tour Band took part— "they're that large that we had to ensure there were no vehicles parked on either side of the parade route". New bands are up and coming, and there are requests to participate from across North America.

Preparation starts again as soon as Parade Day ends. "When the bands are paid, they're given a thank you letter and a printed request to consider the date for next year!" There are mailings to go out including early appeals for funding. In the summer, reminders go out to participants. Each year, Bill and Diane choose a parade theme; this year, it's Teddy Bear's Christmas. As confirmations come back, Bill and Diane lay out the order for the procession. Cogeco videos the Parade, but "they

like information ahead of time" so once all entrants are in and the route finalized, Diane writes a blurb on each. A self-described "hoarder", she is sorting through 30 years of paraderelated paperwork sorting what needs to be passed on to whoever takes over. Diane worries that costs that are going up, with factors like the requirement for an increased police presence. "It can't be done for much under \$10,000." But that's for next year's Chair to worry about.

The 2014 Teddy Bear's Picnic Parade is just ahead and it's going to be fantastic, thanks in large part to Bill and Diane. Don't forget to look out for them on parade day—as Diane says, "When you get stopped on the street and people say 'Great Parade' it's really nice".

Thank you Bill and Diane for your 30 years of commitment to bringing Santa to Acton and enjoyment to thousands of young at heart.
