All across Canada, our thoughts and prayers are with the Vincent and Cirillo families, and all of our Forces personnel.

We reflected, we wore the poppy and we remembered. It was the least we could do.

So fortunate to live in Canada, the best country in the world, we owe our liberties, freedoms and democratic rights to those who were and are today prepared to fight and sacrifice all to defend these cherished values, which we too often take for grant-

Every day is now prescription drug drop-off day in Halton

The abuse of prescription drugs has increased significantly in Canada since 2004.

Every home has half empty prescription pill bottles tucked away in a cabinet, never to be used again, but never discarded. Medication of any type can be harmful for children and adults alike, especially when in the wrong hands and used for the wrong reasons. In Ontario, 72 percent of youths who used prescriptions drugs unlawfully obtained them from their household.

The Halton Regional Police Service has participated in the National Prescription Drug Drop-Off Day (PDOD) for the past two years, seizing over 65 kilograms of unused and unwanted prescription drugs. The PDOD only occurs once a year, so members of the public stockpile medications in anticipation of disposal day.

In addition, local pharmacies often stockpile returned narcotics until the PDOD, leaving them prone to internal theft and possible robberies.

The Halton Regional Police have now installed a "Prescription Drug Drop Box "in the front lobby of five police stations to accommodate the safe and anonymous disposal of unused and unwanted prescription medicine. Get them out of sight and have peace of mind.


We encourage everyone to clean out their cabinets and dispose of all unused

prescription drugs and to make a habit of purging medicine cabinets throughout the year. By doing so, we will all contribute to a safer home and community.

Local pharmacies are also encouraged to participate as it can decrease the risk of theft and robbery.
