Drive clean test centre wants compensation

Owners of Acton Auto Tech - the area's only authorized emissions testing location - would breathe a little easier if the province would re-reimburse them for testing equipment made obsolete by recent changes to the Ontario Drive Clean program.

The Drive Clean program requires vehicles to pass emission tests before they can be sold. Vehicles that fail can get a conditional pass - allowing owners to renew their licence plate sticker - if the owner spends \$450 on repairs which do not result in a pass.

The faster, more accurate technology now required to test vehicles for acceptable levels of pollutants like nitrogen oxides, hydrocarbons and carbon monoxide meant Acton Auto Tech had to replace a \$110,000 machine it purchased for the testing 15 years ago. Only cars built before 1998 get the old test on what comes out of the tailpipe, the new equipment reads a vehicle computer history to se if it meets emission standards. The test can detect problems with poor performance, high emissions or poor fuel

Asking for help in a November, 2012 letter to Wellington-Halton Hills MPP Ted Arnott, Acton Auto Tech owner Floyd Foster said they spent \$13,531 on a new machine, \$1,900 for staff training and pays a \$242 monthly maintenance fee for the computerised equipment.

"We invested money, time and training of staff and it didn't generate the revenue we were promised back in 1999," Foster wrote, adding they want \$50,000 compensation for the old machine, which he said,

did an excellent job up to December 31, 2012.

Arnott forwarded Foster's letter to the Minister of Environment, and on Thursday, Foster said that was the last he'd heard.

Foster said they do approximately eight emission tests daily. "Because no one else in Acton offered the (emission) testing, we took it upon ourselves to of-


