WASTEWISE DONATION

A \$25,000 cheque from Wastewise means more recycling bins for Halton Hills parks. Mayor Rick Bonnette accepted the donation on Tuesday for the 90 bins. Currently there are no recycling bins in local parks, except for two in Prospect Park.

Phase one will see recycling bins placed in Georgetown parks, and Wastewise official Debbie Smart before the end of the year, five recycling bins will be placed at the Acton Sports Park near the arena, and nine in Prospect Park.

RESTORE EXTRACURRICULARS

Volunteers will be asked to help run extracurricular activities in Halton public elementary schools where the teacher's union instituted a ban on extracurricular activates in response to the province's Bill 115 which froze wages, cut benefits and reduced teacher bargaining rights. In a unanimous motion last Wednesday, trustees asked the director to develop and implement strategies to "secure supervision for extracurricular activities".

SOBEYS STRIKE

So far, the only apparent fallout in Acton from the strike by Sobeys warehouse workers in Milton is a shortage of an 18-pack of drinking water – a shortage one of the managers, who identified himself only as Craig, said wasn't due to the strike, but "just because we ran out."

Asked if Acton shoppers will face empty shelves because of the strike, Craig said, "we'll have to see what they short us," when delivery trucks arrive.

The 480 United Food and Commercial Workers in Milton walked off the job at midnight Monday after rejecting a nine-year, final offer.

TOP CHEF CANADA HOPEFUL




