Mayor decries growth plan 'insanity'

Golden Horseshoe plans premature

With the "ink not dry" on the province's Places to Grow legislation, it is "premature" for the province to extend growth plan horizons for the Greater Golden Horseshoe (GGH) 10

time, according to Halton Hills Mayor Rick Bonnette.

He made the comments last Monday as councillors dealt with a joint submission from planners from Halton

extended it would mean Halton would grow to just over one million people by 2041, a 15 per cent increase from the planned 780,000.

Places to Grow decision, Bonnette said the new growth and employment number targets will drive up the price of vacant land. "Let the OMB decide what's going to happen with the Places to Grow," Bonnette said, adding, "Let's put the brakes on," and calling the provincial policy to look to 2041 "ridiculous."

Regional/Acton Councillor Clark Somerville said the province must "stop the insanity" and give them enough time to catch up and approve the Places to Grow growth plans, before making additional changes.

Council endorsed a joint planners' submission to wait until the scheduled growth review in 2016 before dealing with the latest proposed changes from the province.






Mayor Bonnette said the province mandated that Halton's population must almost double to 780,000 by 2031, and that it is wrong for the Town to have to pay to defend provincial growth decisions at the OMB. "Maybe the provincial politicians will think a little bit before they start implementing programs onto us," Bonnette said, adding the cost to defend the growth decisions at the OMB end up on tax
