## Extracurricular strategies implemented in Halton

The Halton District School Board has created a procedure outlining strategies to secure supervision for extracurricular activities in schools including greater involvement by volunteers.

The process was developed for secondary and elementary schools where teachers have withdrawn voluntary support for extracurriculars. An announcement in late February by the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation (OSSTF) allowed for individual teachers to make their own choice as to whether they participate in extracurricular activities.

Since the announcement, many secondary teachers have returned to volunteer duties. The Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO) has not yet made a similar determination, therefore the Halton District School Board is utilizing its process to assess what extracurricular activities might be offered and implemented with parent supervision.

Individual principals will work with their superintendents to determine which extracurriculars do not have teacher supervision, and what activities may be offered during April to June. Once these activities have been determined, parents may wish to consider their willingness and availability to supervise a specific student activity, and participate in the screening process and required train-

The process will first differentiate the varying levels of risk for the extracurriculars offered, and then screen volunteers dependent on the risk level of the activity. In all cases, the school principal retains the responsibility for the safety of students, and as a result, the approval and assignment of a volunteer to any extracurricular supervision.

Principals may opt to

expedite the start of extracurriculars identified as low-risk, if the volunteer meets the required criteria for supervising that activity. A central committee has been created to assess applicants who want to assume supervision responsibilities for higher risk activities.

"It is definitely our preference to have our teachers lead extracurricular activities for our students," says David Euale, Director of Education for the Halton District School Board. "By implementing this process to include greater involvement by volunteers in supervision of extracurriculars, we hope to strike the balance among student engagement, the principal's responsibility for student safety, and the volunteer's eagerness to participate."
