TOWN DIGEST

EMERALD ASH BORER ATTACK

The Town's \$30,000 fight against the thumb-nail size Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) includes search, destroy and inoculate. The exotic wood-boring beetle, native to Asia, is feeding on Ash trees in North America, including infestations in Georgetown and Oakville.

Since July 2008, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency restricted all firewood movement in an out of Halton after EAB was found in Oakville. Two failing Ash trees were removed from Georgetown last year, leading the Town to check and remove affected trees on its property and begin a tree inoculation program using biological insecticide.

In an update to Council, Ted Drewlo, the Manager of Infrastructure Services said Council re-directed \$30,000 during recent budget talks - \$22,500 to remove and replace approximately 40 dead Ash trees, and \$7,500 for the inoculation pilot project.

Drewlo said traps will be set in Ash trees in south Georgetown and Acton to try to detect the Ash Borer before it does its damage. and samples will be collected from branches to check for signs of EAB. Communications with the public would include signs in trees with traps, areas notices with door hangers, information flyers at public counters and on the Town's website.
