A report summarizing the results of the community survey was released last week. The survey was aimed at gauging the opinions of Halton residents on policing matters. Survey recipients were asked questions relative to their experience with the Service, perceptions of crime in the community, feelings of

safety and police priorities. The questions asked were intended to provide comparative results for similar surveys conducted, most recently in 2009.

A survey package was mailed out to 2,205 random households and returned surveys were completely anonymous. Survey results were obtained from 503 responses (22.8 per cent response rate).

Highlights included:

- · 64 per cent of respondents had some form of contact with the HRPS over the last five
- · Respondents perceived the top five concerns in their community as: aggressive/ careless driving, vandalism, residential break-ins, thefts from cars and drugs in schools.
- 98 per cent of respondents expressed feeling safe within their homes during daylight hours, and 96 per cent felt safe within their homes after dark.

hours, 97 per cent of respondents felt safe in public parks, but that number dropped to 67 per cent after dark.

- 36 per cent of respondents were most fearful of having someone break in to their homes while away, and 24 per cent were fearful it would happen while they were home.
- · 37 per cent of respondents were afraid of being a victim of a drunk driving accident.
- 51 per cent of respondents felt police should spend more time controlling illegal drug use and 43 per cent felt police should spend more time enforcing traffic laws.
- · Preferred methods of contacting police were via telephone (57 per cent) email (38 per cent) and the HRPS website (26 per cent).

Ninety-three percent of respondents were very satisfied or reasonably satisfied with the work of the Service, and many

 During daylight people complimented officers' professionalism and compassion. However, others expressed a desire for officers to slow down when responding to calls, and be more mindful of their driving habits overall.

> "We really value receiving feedback from the public on policing issues that matter most to them. It helps us understand how the public perceives our Service, and policing and public safety issues in general, so that we can tailor our priorities to better align with theirs," said Hal-ton Police Chief Steve Tanner, "I am extremely proud of the work done on a daily basis, 24/7 by all of our uniform and civilian members. The satisfaction ratings within this most recent survey clearly illustrate the extremely high level at which our front-line staff perform and are a credit to our police service and to the policing profession. It is an honour to have the results

of this current survey that clearly illustrate our close and very successful partnership with our community.'

Overall, the 2012 survey results were consistent with the most recent 2009 survey and will be considered in the business planning process, assigning priorities, developing or fine-tuning existing community programs, crime prevention and education activities and enforcement.

Data collected through the survey will assist the Service and the public in developing strategies to address various problems and issues, and as an input to the Corporate Business Planning pro-
