
### **Kudos to Heritage Acton**

Almost torn down to make way for a parking lot, the Acton Town Hall is now a "majestic addition to the Province's stock of heritage properties," thanks to a lot of hard work by a lot of people dedicated to preserving Acton's rich history.

That history, and the successful efforts by Heritage Acton to preserve and enhance it, were the focus of celebrations on Sunday at the official opening of the expanded Willow Street building, which now includes a Citizens' Hall and elevator.

In his remarks on Sunday – which he repeated in the Ontario Legislature on Tuesday – Wellington-Halton Hills MPP Ted Arnott praised the grass roots efforts, based on community spirit and partnership, that saved the 19th century Town Hall from demolition, and then lovingly restored it to again become a community social centre.

Acton is indebted to Heritage Acton for its vision, dedication and fundraising to not just save, but enhance, an Acton landmark.




#### TEN YEARS AGO

## Candlelight Tribute honours the ultimate sacrifice

Tonight (Thursday) the Acton Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion continues a tradition started not too long ago; a Candlelight Walk to honour veterans.

Near the end of World War II, Canadians were the main force behind the liberation of the Netherlands and the end of Nazi occupation. Following this, to show their gratefulness the Netherlands, every five years, celebrated Liberation Day.

On May 4, they remember those who fought and died in wars. The day following, May 5 would be a celebration of freedom and include parades, festivals, music, praise for veterans and, of course, two minutes of silence at 8 p.m. out of respect for those who had passed. In 1990, the celebration was changed to a National holiday and became an annual event.

Decades later after the liberation, the Netherlands

have not forgotten our veterans and Canadian veterans were invited to return to the Netherlands by their government to help commemorate VE Day. They were treated with the utmost honour and respect.

That is the abbreviated background. With mutual admiration, our Legion Branch decided to host a Candlelight Walk to honour all veterans. Some might ask, with Remembrance Day, why we need this event. I personally think another day annually to reflect on sacrifice of others for a few brief moments is hardly enough to say thank you for our freedom.

Two groups will walk to the Acton Cenotaph – one from St. Albans Church, and one from the GO Train parking lot. The candles then continue to light the Cenotaph, while fallen comrades look down from above.

A walk in silence, a thank you, a reaffirmation of our loyalty to our country with our National Anthem, and the flickering flame to remind all those who drive by the Cenotaph later that evening. It truly sounds peaceful which is what they fought for...peace.

We hope to see you there, and if you can't make it out for the procession, you can still thank a veteran that day and any/every day for their service.



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
