#### KEEP PEDALLING

The kilometres that Halton Hills residents are putting on their bikes in the Community Cycling Challenge continues to climb – 39,816-kilometres from 218 riders at press time – and the stakes are higher now, as well.

Paul Armstrong Insurance had pledged \$5,000 to the Georgetown Hospital Foundation if the 200,000-kilometre goal is reached by the end of summer. Georgetown Canadian Tire pledged \$20,000 when the half-way, 100,000-kilometre mark is met, and the \$20,000 from Peter Gilgan Foundation/Mattamy Homes, is now \$25,000 as it will match the Armstrong pledge when the goal is reached. "When we get to 200,000-(kilometres) the extra bump up is \$30,000 - if you add it all up, it's \$50,000 is on the line to the hospital when we meet our challenge of 200,000-kilometres," Fogal said, urging people to join the challenge at www.bikechallnge.ca

## Town ready for emergencies

When preparing for an emergency, the mindset is not what if, but when. Proof that Halton Hills responders are ready in the event of an emergency has been verified by Emergency Management Ontario in an annual review of compliance with the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act.

With mandatory Certified Community Management Co-ordinators, and two alternates, a risk management program backed by Town bylaw, Halton Hills' Fire department Deputy-Chief Harry Olivieri detailed components of certification at a recent council meeting.

Olivieri said annual training and exercises are the biggest part of any emergency preparedness plan with at least one training exercise and one training event required annually. There were two training events in Halton Hills last year, including a familiarization for councillors and senior staff of the Emergency Operations Centre. A training event in Georgetown was based on the mall collapse in Elliot Lake.

In the event of emergency, a Community Emergency Notification system will get out the word.
"We have the ability with an electronic computerized program to 
have an automatic callout by using 
the phone system using the phone 
system," he said, adding the system 
makes calls to designated areas. 
The new system was successfully 
tested in the Lakeview area of Acton last year, and again recently in 
a call out to the emergency support 
group.

For 2013, Olivieri said they will

help responders better respond and better manage resources with an Incident Management systems training session, and will test responders with an influenza outbreak scenario and a Hurricane Sandy-type storm.

In congratulating all of the Town's emergency personnel, Mayor Rick Bonnette said they wish they "never, never, never have to go through a disaster, but you don't prepare yourself," Bonnette said, pointing to the tornado that suddenly devastated Goderich several years ago.

"You never know when some sort of disaster will come – you hope it never does happen – but I once took a risk management course they said, 'it's not a matter of if. It is a matter of when," Bonnette said.
