Acton welcomed 25 classic MG cars on Saturday – all owned and driven by members of the Ontario MG T Register, an association of T series MG cars owners.

They came from Uxbridge, Huntsville, London and Sarnia, as well as locally, to attend a weekend meet organized and hosted by Bill and Kathy Sanford, proud owners of a 1950 MGTD.

The oldest car was a 1933 MG L1. In spite of unpredictable weather, the cars followed a scenic rally route planned by Acton residents Gord and Marilyn Whatley. After travelling up hill and down dale around the rural area, including Rattlesnake Hill and other challenging roads, they came to the Acton Fire Station on Churchill Road.

The drivers and their navigators admired the beautifully restored 1926 Studebaker fire truck with Al Scott and Brian Nelles telling the story of the restoration carried out by the Acton Firefighters' Association.

Noon-hour found them at St. Joseph Patron of Canada for a barbecue lunch served by the Knights of Columbus. Members judged the classic cars filling the parking lot, choosing the best looking in each category.
