Senior's program staff honoured

Town staff who operate seniors' centres in Acton and Georgetown met and exceeded operating standards, policies and procedures, and were rewarded with a three-year accreditation from CARF—the Commission on Accreditation and Rehabilitation of Facilities. The staff received a framed certificate at the Town council on Monday.

"This achievement is a reflection of the organization's dedication and commitment to improving the quality of lives of participants within your seniors' citizens, and is an important element in the overall quality of today's focus," said Graeme Goebelle, chair of the Mississauga/Halton Local Integrated Health Network (LIHN) , adding they require all of their health services providers to be accredited with CARF.

Goebelle said the substantial efforts of seniors' staff and the boards of directors of the two seniors' centre ensured they met and exceeded items including quality standards, procedures and polices in areas including heath and safety, risk management, human resources, training programs, quality and performance measures.

He said the seniors' recreation centres play a vital role as a community support service that contributes to the LIHN vision of a seamless health system, promoting optimum mental and physical health and building partnerships for a healthy community.

Household hazardous waste left at the curb can injure waste collectors, and damage the environment if disposed of improperly. Household hazardous waste must not be poured down the drain or storm sewer. Do **not** place household hazardous waste at the curb—it will not be collected.

Household Hazardous Waste Depot at the Halton Waste Management Site



Halton residents can drop off household hazardous waste, free of charge at the Halton Waste Management Site, 5400 Regional Road 25, Milton. There is a 20 litre maximum per visit. No commercial hazardous waste can be accepted. The Halton Waste Management Site is open Monday to Saturday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. For more information visit **www.halton.ca/hhw.**


