

PC Caucus seeks to revive Ontario's manufacturing sector

Ontario can turn around its struggling manufacturing sector, and bring new manufacturing jobs to the province, says Wellington-Halton Hills MPP Ted Arnott.

On July 18, the Ontario PC Caucus released its latest white paper, Paths to Prosperity: Advanced Manufacturing for a Better Ontario. The white paper outlines ideas to encourage the creation of up to 300,000 new manufacturing jobs in Ontario.

"A thriving manufacturing sector is critical to our economic success," Arnott said. "This white paper brings forward ideas that we believe can help turn around our manufacturing sector and create jobs here in Ontario."

Among the ideas proposed in the white paper

· Establishing a new, affordable power rate for manufacturing and resources-based industry at a price which is competitive with neighbouring jurisdictions.

· Matching provincial retraining assistance to the needs of employers and the job market.

 Encouraging investment in new plants and technology to improve productivity by making these investments fully tax deductible.

· Aggressively pushing for more international and interprovincial free trade to open new markets to Ontario businesses.

"Since the Liberals were elected to Government, Ontario has lost 300,000 manufacturing jobs. They have turned a blind eye to the problems faced by manufacturers for far too long," Arnott argued. "We need to actively put policies in place aimed at bringing these good paying jobs back to Ontario."

Arnott has been warning about the troubles facing Ontario's manufacturing sector for years. In 2005, he tabled a Private Member's Resolution in the Ontario Legislature which called on the Provincial Government to establish an all-party Committee of the Legislature to investigate Ontario's industrial and economic competitiveness and to develop an action plan to protect manufacturing jobs in the Province.

"We cannot take current favourable economic conditions for granted," Mr. Arnott argued at the time. "The world isn't standing still and our manufacturers are facing unprecedented challenges in the global marketplace. If we aren't competitive we will lose jobs."

Although Arnott's resolution was passed by the House on November 30, 2006, the Liberal Government did not allow the Committee hearings to take place.

SUMMER VACATION FOR THE FOOD BANK PROGRAM
