Skatepark condition questioned

A Town staffer's contention that there are "no major divots or holes" unfilled at the Acton skateboard park is dubious at best and potentially dangerous at worst.

A visit to the park beside the Acton arena last Thursday, and again on Monday, found several areas where chunks of concrete are loose, one big hole at the base of a ramp, and cracks on almost all of the features. As well, at least one base cement pad has shifted and is now uneven, providing quite a bump for an unsuspecting rider.

As 30 participants of the Town's Epic Sports Camp, as well, as casual boarders, BMXers and scooter riders used the seven-year-old facility last week, several riders said they make a point to telling other kid about the areas to avoid because of "dangerous" and "scary" cracks and holes. They said they felt comfortable using the park despite the poor condition of the concrete – a special blend intended to stand up to hard use on a regular basis – because they know where the problems are.

Town staff said "some cracking" will be treated this summer, and some were repaired in 2009 and 2012 with transparent epoxy filler, and while the cracks may be visible, the voids are filled.

All park users should check out conditions before they ride, but pre-teen boys should not have to issue safety warnings to others avoid cracks, holes and uneven surfaces at a Town facility, named for three Acton teens who died in a senseless train/car accident 13 years ago.
