Celebrating 100 years at the Acton Fall Fair

Looking back while looking to the future

lovingly preserved doll which won first prize for "Best Dressed Doll entered by a girl under 15" at the very first Acton Fall Fair in 1913 will be on display at this year's Fair to help mark the 100th anniversary of the event, billed as the "Best Little Fair in Ontario."

The doll, with its \$2 first prize tag still attached to its skirt, was first entered by 11-yearold Elva Pearen. It will join other Fair memorabilia in a special display depicting the rich history of the Fair, which began as an agricultural exhibition and has grown to become the social event of the season, and a chance for many to see farm animals and implements up close.

While preparing for each Fair includes the time and talents of many

A cherished and volunteers, this milestone anniversary has been a special labour of love for many, including Homecraft President Marg Aitken who has compiled a Fair history to be distributed during this year's event on September 13 to 15. "I feel some relief having this compiled in a booklet and (the historical information) not just sitting on boxes in my house,' Aitken said on Friday, adding, "people will enjoy looking at it."

Along with the doll, which also won first prize at the 50th Acton Fall Fair, Aitken said they have lace and needlework samples, clothing, small pieces of furniture including a cradle and antique tools from past decades.

Massey tractor coming as part of the special anniversary exhibits," Aitken said, adding there will be historical demonstrations on the grounds including stream engine and a 2013 a Ferrier, candle-makers and tinsmiths from Black Creek Pioneer Village.

"We have a couple of vaudeville acts - one is like a sideshow where you go into a small tent and several of the Homecraft ladies will also be in (period) costumes," Aitken said.

There will be a special anniversary Homecraft float in the parade, along with a band involved in the first Fair - the Roval Grenadiers - and the 48th Highlanders, a band that was supposed to be in the 1913 parade but at the last minute could not come. Both are expected to play short concerts on the grounds after the parade. While some of the competition categories have changed over the years - Christmas cakes went out of favour in the baking entries - Aitken said many of the classes are as they were 100 years ago. "Macramé was there for a few years and went out of fashion. and I don't think we have any tatting, and we've

added classes including photography. We still have most of the fruits and vegetables - I think what's changed is the prize money," she said, adding they have a specail barley class with a \$50 prize this year, sponsored by an Acton resident who works for Canadian Malting.

In his message in this year's prize book, Fair Board President Brad Swackhamer praises the work of a "fantastic crew of people" who make the Fair a reality, noting that many small community fairs have faded away.

Swackhamer said the Fair has been part of Acton's proud heritage for a century and has become a tradition for many families. "We look back with pride and admiration to those who have helped along the way, and we look forward with anticipation to what the next century will bring for the Best Little Fair


