Heads-up when dealing with mail to rural addresses - after a year of courtesy deliveries, Canada Post now requires use of civic 911 emergency addresses, not Rural Route designations.

Canada Post spokesman Eugene Knapik said civic addresses are "much more accurate and will provide better service" for approximately 2,000 rural customers in this area. He did not know the return rate for R.R. mail in the Acton, Limehouse and Moffat, but said mail without a civic address is returned to sender if possible, or sent to undeliverable mail where attempts to find the civic address would be made so it would be delivered, but with "significant delay" Knapik said.
