Less money, more hope at Terry Fox Run

The Marathon of Hope continued at the Acton High School track on Sunday, raising \$20,000 for cancer research in the name of Terry Fox, a hero and beacon of hope for all touched by cancer.

Sunday's efforts, while not as fruitful as last year, were a great success according to event organizer Jon Hurst who reported a track filled much of the day by lot of kids, "lots of dogs," 141 participants and 24 volunteers.

Following tradition, Acton's newly named Citizen of the Year, Ron Birrell, and newly-crowned Miss Acton Jordan Lenz and her court cut the ribbon to officially kick-off Sunday's event.

It was the fourth Terry Fox Run for Acton's Jane French. "I had breast cancer and surgery and everything, and then my husband just died a year ago from cancer. I'm hoping that eventually they'll find something to help everyone – there are so many different types of cancer," French said.

It was the 12th Fox Run event for the Nyitrai family, some who weren't born when they started the tradition

of helping fight cancer. "It is a great thing to do right? Its great family bonding and a chance to take part in something that will make a change in peoples' lives," Mark Kyitrai said.

For Miss Acton Jordan Lenz, accompanied by first runner-up Rebecca Nelles, and second runner-up Amanda Van Helden, Terry Fox is a mythic hero. "He is such an inspiration and what he did for us – hopefully we can continue do this (Terry Fox Runs) for him to thank him for all of his efforts in he fight against cancer," Lenz said.
