Fair a success

It could take weeks for the Acton Fall Fair's bottom line – revenue from the beer tent, gate and midway – are released, but most, if not all those who staged this year's 100th anniversary Fair were smiling, although tired, on Sunday evening as they gathered for a wrap-up meal in the Dufferin Rural Heritage Centre.


As crews dismantled exhibit displays and turned the Centre back into an in-door soccer field – play resumes next Monday – Homecraft President Marg Aitken said the centennial celebration was a success, by any measure.

"I think it was fabulous. We had really good crowds. The weather was sketchy on Friday mor-

ning but Education Day went anyway and we had a wonderful time," Aitken said prior to the traditional dinner for Fair volunteers, who earlier formed a human 100 figure out in the parking lot.

Aitken said at times the crowd was 10-deep at tables displaying past Fair scrapbooks and a display of antique items, including a doll which won prizes at both the 1913 and 1963 Fairs. "The (Homecraft) entries were really pretty good, our steam engine was so popular, and next year will be bigger and better," she said.

The anniversary celebrations included a reception for past Fair Board presidents, and for past Miss Actons who marked the 50th anniversary of the pageant.
