The class of 2013 was lauded for leadership in philanthropy and social justice at the 36th annual Commencement Exercises at Acton District High School on Friday evening. In front of a packed house of proud parents, families and friends, the graduates trooped across the stage to accept their Ontario Secondary School diplomas, along with a host of scholarships, awards and bursaries generously donated by local businesses, organizations and individuals who donated cash awards.

"Graduates, please remember to savour each of life's gifts, to appreciate all you have been given and all that you will receive," said Principal Darlene White in her address that urged the students to use their knowledge, skills and penchant for active leadership to make a dif-

White assured the graduates that, with time, they'd see that wisdom isn't a certificate hanging on a wall, but a "mysterious interweaving" of their education, personal experience, and interactions with the world and selfknowledge. "May you find wisdom where ever

you go," White said.

She detailed a impressive list of graduate accomplishments which showed their caring and compassion, including

In her introduction of Valedictorian Damian Ewing, teacher Jen Ross remembered his "unusual seriousness," in Grade nine, and as a student who surprised her by joining improv, in addition to the swim team, student council, volleyball team, key roles in school plays, Big Brothers and studying Material Arts.

To earn an Ontario Secondary School Diploma students must get 18 required credits, including 440 hours of English, 12 elective credits, at least 40 hours of community service, and they must pass literacy and mathematics tests.
