More 'compassionate' cemetery rule review

The 25 per cent surcharge on cemetery product and services fees for non-residents of Halton Hills may be repealed as Town councillors ask the cemetery Advisory Committee to "relax" the definition of a resident to include those who have lived in Halton Hills at some point during their lives.

The issue of the non-resident surcharge was raised by Winston Marshall of Mississauga, who complained after being "shocked and surprised" by the extra cost to bury his late wife Gloria's ashes in a columbarium at Georgetown's Greenwood Cemetery. All cemetery services in Halton Hills have a local and non-local rate, which is 25 per cent higher, and which Marshall called a "slap in the face" to people like his late wife who wanted to be buried near her parents and ancestors.

In an emotional appeal

to councillors on Monday, Marshall said his wife was born, educated and started a family in Georgetown where they lived for decades before retiring to British Columbia in 1999. He said his wife's family settled in Georgetown in the 1935, were merchants in the downtown. and had a street named after them. "People who grew up in Georgetown, (were) raised, educated in Georgetown (and), move away, they should be welcomed back when their time has expired..." Marshall said.

At the instigation of Acton Councillor Jon Hurst, vice-chair of the Town's Cemetery Advisory Committee, the committee, which includes public members, will be asked to take a second look at changing the definition of residents to include all former residents to be more "inclusive and compassionate."

"There is no perfect answer - no perfect policy in the world that is going to work for everybody ... ' Hurst said, adding that relaxing the definition, while maintaining the 25 per cent surcharge for non-residents, is the best answer.

When it was noted that most other Town user fees have a local and a non-local fee schedule to give preference of local residents. Marshall noted it costs the Town the same amount for cemetery services and products when dealing with locals and non-locals.

Initially, Mayor Rick Bonnette said he was "uneasy" with Hurst's intention to effectively waive the non-local fee, but agreed it should be reviewed by the Cemetery Advisory Committee for discussion, and then a recommendation to council. which would then deal with the committee's minutes.
