Pay for value

You only get what you pay for, and when it comes to local elected politicians, Halton Hills has been lucky that its bargain basement pay scale has not meant bottom of the barrel candidates for elected office.

That all will change for the Council elected next October. When it takes office in December with salary increases approved by the current Council on Monday.

Being a municipal councillor - with phone numbers in the book and email access but a click away - means huge demands of time and talents of those who want to serve. They don't do it for the money, yet talk of politicians' salaries and increases (think Duffy, Wallin et al.) often spark snide comments about people living high on the public hog. The staff report said they are "aware that adoption of these recommended increases may be viewed negatively by some members of the community," and stress the salaries are for the office, not the elected official.

Staff said the "sizeable gap" in salaries is due to a lack of a formal salary/market review since 2004 for the positions of mayor and councillor, and corresponding salary increases during that period.

The full-time mayor will receive a 25.7 per cent increase to \$73,008, from \$58,007, a salary that is no longer the lowest of five comparators, but equal the 50th percentile. Part-time councillors elected next October will be paid 21 per cent more to \$29,995, from \$24,714.

Council chose to give the salary increases - no changes were made to benefits - all at once next December, and not phase them in over varying lengths of time during the next term of office. Funds will be also allocated - no dollar amount was given - for each councillor to have an annual budget. As well, councillors will retain the one-third tax exemption for their earnings.

They deserve every penny.
