Safe swim

Swimmers cooled off safely in Fairy Lake on the weekend – the most recent test results found acceptable levels of bacteria in water at the Old Beach. In the 10 weeks of testing conducted by the Halton Health Department this summer, the Old Beach has been closed seven times because of unacceptably high levels of bacteria capable of making people sick.

Asked if he is concerned that the Old Beach has been closed more than it has been open this summer because of high bacteria levels, Halton's Supervisor of Health Inspections, Paul Burgher said "yes and no."

"At that Fairy Lake beach, we know there have always been issues with respect to Fairy Lake itself that could be due to storm water runoff," Burgher said on Tuesday, adding a study currently underway is examining Fairy lake water issues, including quality. The Boathouse beach in Prospect Park was closed in 2007 following a run of unacceptable bacteria levels.

While the regular water quality results last week made the Kelso Conservation Area unsafe for swimming, a later re-test showed acceptable levels of bacteria and the beaches were open, and crowded, on the weekend.

Child safety

Sixty-two local children were processed through a child identification program at the Acton Leathertown Festival on Sunday, providing their parents with identifying information they hope they will never have

Hosted by the Mason Lodges of Wellington, the free MasoniCh.I.P. program includes five parts – a digital video, digital fingerprints, vital child information and a dental bite impression or oral swab for DNA. All of the information is burned onto a CD for the parents, and then the data is erased from the Mason's computer to ensure confidentially.

Regional/Acton Councillor Clark Somerville, a Masonic Lodge member, helped at the Acton Festival, and at a family fun day in Erin the day before when the youngest child processed was a new born. "Imagine trying to get fingerprints from an eight-day old. I managed to get two thumb prints," Somerville said


United Way


