Brain food, now being served

From grab-and-go ter place to feed them? breakfasts, to meal cards to healthy baskets, Acton students can get the nutrition required for learning from Halton's Food for Thought programs that are offered in each school.

"Many, many students are coming to school without the nourishment they need to excel at academics, so we have a variety of programs," said Gayle Cruikshank, executive director of Food for Thought, a Halton program operating in 19 Halton Hills schools, including the three public and one Catholic school in Acton.

Halton Food for Thought is a non-profit agency which receives funding from the Ministry of Children's and Youth Services, Halton Region, generous corporate sponsors, and from the schools' community. "When kids arrive at school, what betThey are better able to learn whether they eat at a morning Breakfast Club or throughout the day with the Healthy Basket program," Cruikshank said, noting there are added benefits including more socialization for the kids who interact with volunteers - often parents/ grandparents of students - and increased sense of general well-being.

At Acton High School, the Food for Thought program is geared to at-risk youth who can use meal cards - last year 10 students received cards at a cost of \$3,600. This year, with funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation and sponsor Aramark Canada, they hope to provide 15 students with meal cards proving them with one nutritious meal per

"We've seen an amaz-

ing difference with the students with this program," Cruikshank said, adding attendance rates also improve. She said at the elementary levels in Acton, there are a variety of programs to meet the needs of each individual school.

At McKenzie-Smith Bennett School Cruickshank said a breakfast program feeds more than 200 students daily, and the Healthy Baskets feed approximately 141 students daily. Combined, the two programs serve more than 12,000 meals a year at a cost of \$7,500.

At Robert Little School, the popular healthy snack program last year provided more than 20,745 meals to 357 students, three mornings per week at a cost of \$5,000. This year, Healthy Baskets will be placed in classrooms three days a week for students to get food throughout the day. At St. Joseph Catholic School, a healthy snack program served 24,704 meals last year at a cost of \$9,400.

While there are no statistics indicating how many Acton students arrive at school without breakfast, or snacks for the day, one school secretary said she people would be "amazed" with the high percentage of students who haven't eaten for a variety of reasons, some like her who doesn't like to eat until mid-morning.

"Whatever the season, Food for Thought is ready to fuel them so they can learn to the best of their ability," Cruikshank said, adding that Food for Thought inspires children and youth to make healthy food choices vital to their development by providing inclusive access to nutritious foods.
