

## Lord Johnny Acton impressed with Acton

Introducing Lord Johnny to the full house of Heritage Acton supporters at the dinner, member Tracey Tyler said after finding Lord Acton on FaceBook, they plotted a fundraising visit, playing on the coincidence of the name, and describing Heritage Acton's fundraising needs.

Tyler said it was evident Lord and Lady Acton had a spirit of adventure, because they said they'd love to come to Acton, Ontario. "We also knew they were smart, because he added 'provided you're for real,"" Tyler said.

Lord Johnny, a selfprofessed pig lover, is a prolific writer with 13 books on an eclectic range of topics including food, hot air ballooning, money, and his newest on the 2012 London Olympics. He told a Globe and Mail reporter last week that he is a "...a kind of professional fraud," who writes about things he knows nothing about, as a go-between experts and the public.

Lord Johnny told the crowd that while his father was famous in British House of Lords for making the shortest speeches, he would

be a little longer, and said that his first impression of Acton is a very impressive community with a sense of "wanting to be in it, all together."

With tales of barking mad ancestors, ties to monarchs going back to the 14th century, Lord Johnny introduced members of his "strange...interesting

family," who include the author of the Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire, and of the famous quote,

"Power tends to corrupt and absolute power corrupts absolutely."

Lord Johnny explained how he inherited his title as a Hereditary Sir when his father died last year. He also said that the family

crest is a severed leg in armour with five drops of blood.

Heritage Acton officials hope that the Absolutely Acton Speakers' Series Lord Acton was the kick-off speaker - will make money to help pay for an addition to the Town Hall Centre, including an elevator.

## Help for seniors

Ontario Liberals will help seniors who choose to remain in their homes by helping with the cost of renovations that make it safer and easier to live independently.

"Our parents and grandparents not only raised each of us, they built the hospitals, schools, roads and businesses that are helping us, today, to raise families of our own," Premier McGuinty said on Wednesday morning as he visited a senior's residence in Georgetown.

A tax credit worth 15 per cent of up to \$10,000 in renovations per year, can be claimed by seniors for their own home or by a family member who is providing a home for an elderly relative.
