

RE: Inquiry for Mayor Rick Bonnette

Mayor Bonnette shared his response to Peter Adema's letter with this newspaper. Good Day Peter,

Thank you for your email. The 4-3 Highway that the consultants working for the Provincial Government are not going through farmland that is designated for more houses. The Regional Official plan is expanding Georgetown's urban boundary to the 10th sideroad and that plan is to last until 2031 and beyond. The 4-3 highway is much further south of Georgetown and so that should alleviate the

concern that these farms are being saved for more houses. Like you, we would like it to still remain as quality farmland. The lands where the highway is being proposed should be kept in the present form until at least 2031 and beyond. The origin of this highway is from pressure from Durham and York region to bring traffic to connect to the 401 at Tremaine. What Halton Hills is saying, before you slash through Halton Hills look first at widening the 401. If this highway goes through it will lead to pressure for more development into the rural area as there won't much

Secondly, what Halton Hills is looking at and we are studying is to see where Hwy #7 can be widened to also help the traffic flow on this highway. So this concern of yours is very valid. As a matter of fact, the MTO originally had a proposal 4-4 which was going to run north of Georgetown and Acton and connect to Guelph and Kitchener. Then they backed down as it was getting complicated coming through the NEC and the Greenbelt lands.

I hope this clarifies our position.
