Acton fire crews raced to

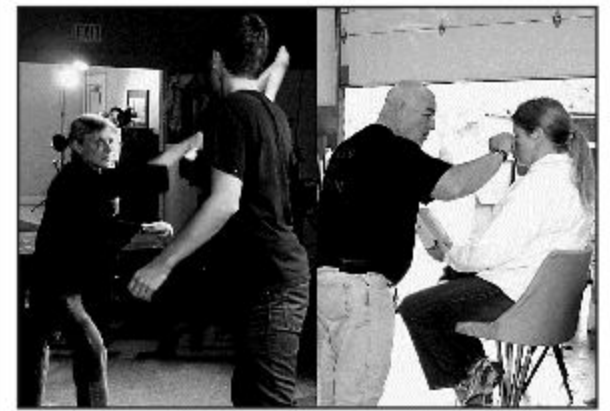

Heritage Acton, has offered them a wonderful new venue at 19 Willow St. N. in the heart of Acton. Still a bit of a secret, The Acton Town Hall Centre has a lovely, intimate Victorian theatre restored to its former glory. Just the ticket for this group of thespians! It is hoped that both Acton and Georgetown patrons will find something of interest in GLT's amazing line up of comedies this season starting with "The Lion in Winter" opening October 28. After all, its always worth the short drive to Acton to see an amazing show!
