Lack of development changes stall some Acton projects

What is not in the Town's short and longterm capital spending plans is as telling as what is in the budget forecasts. While next year's capital budget includes \$12.49-million in projects, there is also a list of 24 socalled unfunded projects, totalling \$8.2-million that won't be built because there is no money.

The Town's capital forecast to 2021 has \$101-million in funded projects, subject to annual review, but there are also 193 unfunded projects costing \$116-million in the long-range forecast. The Town is counting on Development Charge (DC) revenue to help pay for the unfunded

projects. "Hopefully, we'll get some industrial development on the 401 corridor, and start getting some DCs which is really important," Mayor Rick Bonnette said following capital budget debate last Wednesday.

Because of the lack of DCs, \$2.3-million to reconstruct Glen Lawson Road is now on the unfunded list, along with \$2.4-million for the design, engineering and construction of an expanded Acton Seniors Centre, originally in the 2014/15 forecast, and \$2.45-million for design and construction of Acton Youth Space, originally in the 2013/14 forecast.

Following the meeting,

Acton Councillor Mike O'Leary said they can't do everything in one year, and noted there are major projects -expanding the Georgetown library and cultural centre and expansion at Mold-Masters SportsPlex - funded for next year.

"So much depends on Development Charges - a lot (of the budget) is just fixing things that need to be fixed," O'Leary said on Tuesday, adding just because a project is unfunded in a budget, doesn't mean that it will never be funded as DCs become available,

Regional/Acton Councillor Clark Somerville said the approved capital budget and forecasts are "prudent" and "based on reality."

"Development Charges have slowed down, and they are a major source of funding. A year ago, we thought the economic situation would be better, but we're still in the midst of a horrible recession," Somerville said on Tuesday, predicting that the debate over the operating budget, slated for January, will be even tougher.

Included in next year's capital budget is \$858,000 to reconstruct Commerce Crescent, \$820,000 to replace the Maria Street bridge and \$200,000 for a South Acton Land Use

43 per cent increase in Town rental fees at the Georgetown Indoor Pool, the non-profit Halton Hills Blue Fins swim team asked to become "more active" in the Town's fee decision-making process.

Blue Fins spokesman Michael Zuraw made the request last Monday at a public meeting into a consultant's report that recommends a new full cost recovering policy for the Town's various rates and fees. Zuraw said like the Acton Aqua Ducks at the Acton Indoor Pool, affiliated club fee, but operated at a deficit last

When Dianne Theoret-Major, speaking for the Halton Hills Synchros swim club, expressed similar financial concerns, and told councillors their group had not been informed by the Town of the rate and fee report, she was told there is still time to comment on the report.

Staff said declining enrollments in both swim clubs could be due to increased fees and/or a downturn in the economy.
