# Council to debate Eden Mills Community Hall energy retrofit plan

### support solar power, but don't like the look

Controversial plans to install two huge solar panels on Main Street beside the Eden Mills Community Hall will be debated by Guelph/ Eramosa Township Council on Monday. The Township co-owns the Hall with the Eden Mills Community Club, which handles maintenance, renovations and fundraising, and Mayor Chris White said Council must decide if the majority of the community wants to proceed.

"Obviously, some people may have a little concern about how it looks, but the vast majority of those folks don't live near it." White said on Monday, adding the heritage issues puts them between a rock and a hard place. "These decisions are never easy. I've got more e-mails saying they love the concept than not...the majority of folks support it," White said, adding everybody supports green energy, so the debate

Many village residents is down to "subjective aesthetics".

### **Trillium Grant**

At Council's request, proponents explained the energy retrofit plan at a public meeting last Tuesday, and the Community Club, the village's Going Carbon Neutral project and Millpond Association opened the meeting with the announcement of a \$120,000 Ontario Trillium Foundation grant, and a \$50,000 incentive loan from the Wellington-Waterloo Community Futures Development Corporation, to help pay for the energy retrofit at the Hall, which includes the ground mounted solar panels.

With a crowd of approximately 100 people, it was standing room only in the Community Hall for the meeting, and emotions ran high at times as proud village residents, including members of one of the Club's youth groups, defended their positions.

Village resident, architect Charles Simon explained the project would cut energy costs and make the Hall more attractive to renters with a patio area along side the building, a bridge to the mill pond, outdoor seating and landscaping, upgraded parking and the solar panels, which will generate revenue in 10 years.

After numerous residents questioned why the solar panels could not be moved or hidden, Simon said the proposed sideby-side location of the two tilting solar panels, approximately 10-by-20feet, installed at least nine feet off the ground, is the most efficient.

While supporting the green energy plans, resident Al McBride wants the solar panels integrated with the historical image of the village. "I'm not against carbon neutral. I'm not against alternate energy. I think they should be made to fit in with the historical impression that the village has," McBride

### 'Charming, magical' village

Village resident and gallery owner, Michael Coull, said it would be more efficient, but possibly more expensive, to incorporate the solar panels into the architecture of the building with a new porch across the front of the Hall. "This is a charming, magical village - that's why I came, and I was made to feel very welcome, but I tell you, I'm not feeling quite so welcome now that these panels may end up out my front door.'

George Kennedy, one of a half-dozen Hall youth group members in the audience, said the plans preserve the beauty of the village and plan for the future. "We're the ones that this village is being left to, as well, and I would say we all approve of this plan, Kennedy said.

Guelph/Eramosa Township Councillor Doug Breen said he has confidence in the community, which is at a crossroads, based purely on ascetics. "You're all in the same boat - vou're pulling in basically the same direction. You just have to decide what colour to paint the boat," Breen said.
