Halton District School Board receives funding for two new Milton schools

ment announced funding for two new schools as part of a \$77 million announcement in new school construction in the Halton District School Board. The announcement was made by Halton MPP Indira Naidoo-Harris at P.L. Robertson Public School in Milton.

Both schools will be located in southwest Milton to assist with accommodation pressures in this growing community. The elementary school will be built for 776 students and the secondary school will accommodate 1,200 students. The elementary school is anticipated to open in September 2018 and the high school is anticipated to open in September 2019.

"This is great news for students in Milton," said Stuart Miller, Director of Education for the Halton District School Board. "We're grateful to the Ontario Ministry of Education for recognizing the growth and chal- laire Viamonte.

Today the Ontario govern- lenges we're having in this part of the Board. These new, stateof-the-art schools will serve as wonderful learning spaces for students as we do our best to help them to learn, grow and succeed."

"We are very pleased to begin planning for these two new schools in the growing community of Milton," said Kelly Amos, Chair, Halton District School Board. "The addition of these schools will help us continue to provide safe, accessible and engaging learning environments for our students.'

Across Ontario, 28 new schools are being built and 23 schools are being renovated as part of the government announcement.
