
OPP remind motorists to 'Clear the snow'

Fire tanker accreditation could lower your home or farm insurance premiums

The Guelph Eramosa Fire Department conducted a Tanker Shuttle Accreditation test at the Wellington County works yard. A Fire Marshal representative was on hand to measure flow rates. Deputy Fire Chief Jim

Petrik explained, "We have to be able to sustain high volume flow for two hours. That demonstrates we are able to protect our rural residents that don't have hydrants." adding that residents might thus get a break on their home or farm insurance.

As part of a mutual aid program with Fergus, Puslinch, Guelph and Erin, holding tanks were set up and trucks shuttled water from Rockwood hydrants.

Mayor Chris White was on hand in Rockwood for the testing. When asked about insurance rate reductions, White said, "I would also encourage residents to contact their insurance companies regarding this accreditation. If you have a burning building, (The Fire Department) being able to sustain full flow for two hours—that's pretty impressive."
