## **Students:** get your vaccinations

A deadline is looming for Halton Region students born in 1999 and 2000 who have not completed the province s mandatory vaccination schedule.

Students who do not submit proof of the required vaccinations to the Halton Region Health Department by Feb. 16, 2017 could face suspensions starting March 1.

The provincial Immunization of School Pupils Act (ISPA) requires all children and adolescents in public primary and secondary schools receive certain vaccinations in order to be allowed to attend school.
