



Million dollar fire closes Highway 7

The fire call came in shortly after 9:30 Monday morning for a property on Highway 7, just east of Rockwood, at the corner of the 7th Line in Guelph - Eramosa Township. The home and large shop were unoccupied, but the home was receiving some minor renovations. Officials said that a total of six fire departments were involved, primarily supporting the water shuttle required at this rural location. Tankers

from Guelph-Eramosa, Acton, Puslinch, Guelph, Fergus and Erin-Hillsburg were seen shuttling to and from the site.

By early afternoon, fire fighters had brought the blaze under control and were working to douse remaining hot spots and check the stability of the remaining structure. Fire officials estimated the damage to be in the \$1 million range. Fire Chief John Osborne from Guelph – Eramosa Fire Department, indicated that were no injuries to fire fighters, but that he had concerns because of the risks associated with ice and the cold temperatures.

Firefighters worked diligently, but cautiously to secure the building for inspection. Chief Osborne indicated that they hadn't yet entered the building, "Once we have determined the structural integrity of the building, we'll be able to begin our investigation. So at this time we do not know what caused this fire." Given the number of fires at vacant buildings in the

area over last several months, investigators will be looking for clues that link this fire to others. However, initial comments from the first crews on the scene didn't suggest that there was any connection. "There were no footprints in the snow around the building, it was pristine, and there were no signs of forced entry when we first arrived," said one crew member. Fire Marshal officials were on the scene, waiting to begin their investigation.
