Canadian/Chinese Cultural photo exhibit kicks off Canada 150 celebrations

A fascinating and poignant exhibit of archival photos covering 100 years of Canadian/Chinese relations will be launched by Halton Hills' Mayor Rick Bonnette on Saturday, January 14 at 2 p.m. at the Halton Hills Cultural Cen-

"Canadians in Chengdu (China)" is a gift to Canadians from a group of Chinese historians, artists, and corporate donors. They began collecting and curating these photographs in 2007 to retain a period lost in China's post-revolutionary history.

The collection tells the story of courageous Canadian missionaries in China from 1892 to 1952, and their role in founding the West China Union University in Chengdu. Modern for its day, the university included the first Faculty of Dentistry in China. These Canadians loved China and worked under harsh condicountry's medical and educational modernization, and leaving a lasting footprint. Some are buried there, and many gave their children Chinese names out of deep respect.

Hundreds of Chinese graduates of the university helped develop a modern health care system in China after 1949 to present day. Today, West China Medical Centre at Sichuan University is one of the largest health care teaching centres in China.

The original display is now housed in a dedicated museum just outside the major city of Chengdu, capital of Sichuan Province. It was honoured by two Canadian Governors General - Michaelle Jean and David Johnston, and featured at the Canadian Embassy in Beijing.

The exhibit is timely for the Town of Halton Hills. In a special ceremony on June

Halton Regional Police releases 2016 impaired driving statistics

Overall number charged with driving under the influence down from 2015, but totals from RIDE up

The Halton Regional Police Service (HRPS) has released its impaired driving statistics for 2016, including its annual December RIDE campaign and overall year-over-year totals.

Results from RIDE, a program held from December 1 to 31 in partnership with community agencies such as MADD Canada and funded in part by the Ministry of Community Safety, are as follows:

- 266 roadside tests conducted
- · 51 impaired driving arrests (this compares to 31 arrests during the same

period in 2015)

- 47 three-day suspensions issued
- 2 seven-day suspensions issued
- 5 24-hour suspensions issued (G1/G2 drivers)

Overall impaired driving arrests in Halton Region, however, decreased from 425 in 2015 to 404 in 2016.

"Impaired driving by drug or alcohol is a threat to community safety, and the reality is it isn't a holiday, weekend or night-time problem," said Nishan Duraiappah, Deputy Chief of Police. "As such, it is and will remain a top priority for our Service all day, every day of the year. Enforcement alone isn't the answer, and we will continue to partner with other organizations to weave elements of prevention and social development into our work towards enhancing traffic safety in our community."

In addition to enforcement programs like RIDE, officers conducted preventative projects at licensed establishments throughout Halton to educate patrons on impairment. Volunteers had the opportunity to check their blood alcohol levels

on-the-spot by providing breath samples into roadside screening devices. 52 men and women participated. Of these, 29 registered a pass (under 0.05 mg alcohol/100 ml blood), 15 a warning (between 0.05 and 0.08 mg alcohol/100 ml blood), and eight failed (over 0.08 mg alcohol/100 ml blood).

To ensure that the impaired driving message was heard by all drivers of all ages, High School Liaison Officers attended several Halton high schools to deliver its annual RIDE 101 education program. RIDE

101 teaches students about the influence drugs and alcohol can have on a driver's perception and ability to complete simple tasks by enabling them to experience the world through the lens of goggles that mimic its effects.

These measures and others are part of the Service's broader Community First policing philosophy that focuses on incorporating the four pillars of (community) safety and well-being into service priorities: Emergency Response, Risk Intervention, Prevention, and Social Development.
