Community Living North Halton gets funding boost

Three more residential units will be able to open to some of Halton's most vulnerable citizens thanks to provincial funding announced Monday.

Helena Jaczek, minister of Community and Social Services and Halton MPP Indira Naidoo-Harris dropped by the Community Living North Halton offices on Nipissing Rd. to announce that the local nonprofit agency will be receiving \$215,000.

Greg Edmiston, executive director of Community Living North Halton said the funding is great news.

This will be used for a step-down treatment program we re opening for three people, he said, adding that many people will benefit from the transitional program in Glen Williams over time.

The funds are part of \$2 million in capital funding provided across the province to help improve existing residential units with renovations and repairs through developmental service agencies.

Another 51 people will have good accommodation as a result, Jaczek said, referring to people with developmental disabilities in agencies across Ontario. Funds will be used to repair and paint the building's exterior, upgrade heating and cooling system, renovate bathrooms and replace windows.

This is an important investment that will have a meaningful and long-lasting impact on the lives of adults with developmental disabilities in Ontario, said Naidoo-Harris.

In Halton this means much-needed repairs and renovations to the Community Living North Halton residence, she added. This facility provides vital services and supports for some of our most vulnerable community members.

Investments like these are critical in helping agencies like Community Living North Halton build capacity which in turn will help in addressing wait-lists, Naidoo-Harris said.

We foresee a lot of people requiring residential care and supports in the years to come, she said.

Developmental service agencies offer a wide range of supports for people with developmental disabilities, depending on their needs. This includes providing an accessible, safe and comfortable home, connecting people to health and social services, and encouraging people to stay active and engaged with family, friends, and their community.
