Rockwood Lions Club supports, honours Project Lifesaver



Lions Clubs worldwide refer to the spirit of their mission as 'lionism'. Rockwood's own Lion's Club has been performing lionism for 45 years now, making enormous contributions to the community through support for those in need. This was on full display after their bimonthly dinner at Rockmosa on March 1, where several community members spoke about a unique program -'Project Lifesaver'- that assists in locating individuals suffering from Autism, Alzheimer's, or otherwise at risk of wandering. The Lions club has partnered with them since 2011, assisting with equipment costs and awareness, spurred by the concern that those vices adds that when who couldn't afford it might not get to partici-

The program not only has a high success rate, it borders on perfection: according to Elizabeth Kent of Victim Services Wellington, every search they've done has been successful. It's a new program that utilizes old technology: radio waves. Participants don radio-transmitting bracelets which can be tracked with a hand-held receiver unit, operated by police. It's a surprise in our GPS-dominated world that radio is used, but the waves can go through walls and weather conditions that makes it the superior technology.

Constable Gord Woods of Guelph Police Sera caregiver discovers a person in their care (who wears the bracelet) is missing, they need to inform police immediately: even an hour spent looking takes away valuable time a trained officer could spend in those first critical minutes. Fortunately, they've not experienced any tragedy to date, and that success has generated such enthusiasm for the program that clubs like the Lions have really gotten behind it. Most recently, this support has enabled the purchase of one more receiver, bringing the total to three for Wellington.
