Ten of the 14 Conservative Party leadership candidates vying to succeed Stephen Harper as party leader in May gathered at the Burlington Convention Centre for an area riding meet and greet on Sunday (March 5).

The non-party-sanctioned event was co-organized by the Burlington Conservative Association in conjunction with its four sister associations in Halton.

Open to both area party members and the public, the three-hour gathering was attended by roughly 800 voters and featured a meet-and-greet session with the candidates following remarks from each.

We wanted an opportunity for our membership mainly to actually meet and greet the candidates, said the associations candidate of record Mike Wallace, who served as member of Parliament (MP) for Burlington from 2006-15.

The majority of the time is for them to mingle with actual party members. And it is open to the public, so it s party members and those who are thinking about joining I think it's fair that if people the party are thinking about supporting a candidate,

that they have an opportunity to at least say hello to them, and that s what the purpose of today was.

The 10 candidates in attendance represented a fairly diverse cross-section of the Canadian Conservative spectrum.

There were a couple of familiar local faces among the field of candidates in attendance, with Michael Chong and Lisa Raitt currently serving as MPs for Wellington-Halton Hills and Milton, respectively.

Businessman and reality-TV personality Kevin O Leary was also in attendance after skipping out on a party-sanctioned debate in Edmonton last week, declaring publicly he didn t approve of the format.

Kellie Leitch, Chris Alexander, Pierre Lemieux, Erin O Toole, Rick Peterson, Andrew Saxton and Steven Blaney rounded out the field. Absent were Deepak Obhrai, Maxime Bernier, Andrew Scheer and Brad

Each candidate was given six minutes to address the room with common conservative themes like lower taxes, smaller government, deficit and debt reduction, immigration reform and jobs a common refrain throughout the hour of speeches.
