Councillor Corey Woods presented information regarding an endangered species of Magnolia tree know as the Cucumber Tree. Woods reported to council that the tree zoned tolerant and inexpensive. It grows to 60-80 feet tall. Woods donated \$1000 of his own money to have Guelph/Eramosa Township plant several of the trees. Council thanked Councillor Woods for
